Our firm recently conducted a survey of 662 likely Birmingham, AL voters. The survey instrument combined IVR technology for mobile phones and SMS-to-web responses for cell phones. The margin of error is +/- 3.93%. This was an independent survey for a local organization and not for any mayoral campaign.

Below is a summary of our findings.

- More than two thirds of Birmingham voters say they are likely to vote to reelect Mayor Woodfin with 52% of voters saying they will definitely vote to re-elect Woodfin.
- When Randall Woodfin is matched against former Mayor William Bell, County Commissioner LaSahunda Scales, and Chris Woods, among those voters expressing an opinion, the choices are:

0	Former Mayor Bell	17.3%
0	Commissioner Scales	16.5%
0	Mayor Woodfin	61.5%
0	Chris Woods	4.8%

• When asked about Mayor Woodfin's job performance in handling the COVID pandemic in the city of Birmingham, among those voters expressing an opinion:

0	Favorable	77%
0	Unfavorable	23%

Our Analysis

Compared to elections in other major cities across the South, Mayor Woodfin is in a very strong position headed into the fall. Given his significant financial advantage over those considering running, Woodfin is the favorite and it is conceivable that he could expand his current support north of 60%.

The public gives Mayor Woodfin very strong marks for steady leadership during the COVID crisis. (Previous surveys show more than 90% of residents supported the mask ordinance.) Woodfin was the first Mayor in Alabama and one of the first in the nation to follow recommendations from health professionals and require a mask and social distancing.

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In addition, support for Woodfin has also been likely buoyed by Birmingham having the largest job growth and private investment over any three-year period in recent Birmingham history.

While Woodfin is the clear favorite to lead the ticket, the race for second place should be much more interesting. While our survey shows the race between Bell and Scales for second is in a dead heat, Scales has the best chance to gain ground. Because Bell has been in Birmingham politics for more than two decades, he is well known with voters. Given that his support is less than 20% despite his high name ID, his campaign will have a difficult time gaining ground on a popular incumbent. Scales, on the other hand, is less known and therefore could improve her standing in the coming months if she is able to raise money to fund a media campaign. One can anticipate the race for second place to be highly contentious and negative as Scales and Bell have a long history of being enemies who have regularly attacked each other.

While any prediction this far out is subject to revision, should trends hold we expect that Woodfin will win re-election, Scales will finish a distant second, and Bell will finish in third place. Chris Woods will finish in single digits and a distant fourth.
